Excellence in Promoting Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging (DEIB)

Excellence in Research

Outstanding Student Jessica Mitchell




Jessica Mitchell has been a consistent delight to have taught and support to her peers and should be recognized at PAU stars for her compassion, understanding, curiosity, and humility.

Excellence in Promoting Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging (DEIB) Francesco Yepez-Coello



Francesco has shown drive and initiative in spearheading and collaborating on multiple projects in his research lab, with particular interests in integrating cultural responsiveness into risk assessment and management work. Francesco is first author on a peer-reviewed article on how to use the Cultural Assessment for Risk of Suicide (CARS) to detect suicide risk in marginalized patients, and on a book chapter on the psychology of terrorism. He has also led efforts to train licensed clinicians in best practices for integrating culture into risk assessment and management, and gave a presentation on culturally responsive suicide risk assessment at WPA. He further developed his presentation into a workshop that he will present with other lab members in the Suicide Research Symposium and at APA's National Conference. Francesco's passion for expanding access to mental healthcare shows throughout his work, and his dissertation. He collaborated with PAU faculty to translate the CARS into Spanish and is conducting an acceptability study of the measure.

Excellence in Research Mariel Alano



Mariel conducted the first known study on the mental health and help-seeking experiences of transgender Filipino Americans. Her proposal was incredibly well researched and written, and her passion for understanding experiences and providing affirmative care at this identity intersection is clear. She was motivated by personal experiences as a Filipino American who has a transgender sibling to do a deep dive into cultural factors that shape the mental health experiences of trans Filipino people. Her deep passion for this topic is clear in the quality of the work she has conducted. Her proposal was incredibly well-researched and written. She recruited and interviewed nine trans Filipino Americans. Her interviews were incredibly rich, and qualitative data led to the identification of 19 subthemes nested in the four following principal themes: Family, Culture, and Identity; Visibility, Safety, and Discrimination; Navigating Intersectional Identities; and Mental Health, Coping, and Resilience. Throughout her data analysis and discussion, she was thoughtful and attentive to the cultural experiences of her participants, and her findings provide important visibility and deeper understanding for an under-represented, intersectionally minoritized population.

Excellence in Research Maya Wong



Maya was so keen to explore healing-centered engagement (HCE), a framework conceptualized to build on trauma-informed approaches to better offer people of color a means to engage with their collectivism, strength, and cultural practices for healing from racial trauma. Delphi polls are traditionally conducted with academics and subject matter experts, and Maya flipped this on its head to accurately recognize that the 'experts' of racial trauma were regular people in the community. Over multiple iterations, her community experts used HCE to generate culturally aligned therapeutic practices and clinical approaches, and these approaches were much deeper and richer than traditional approaches to treating racial trauma. I see this work as moving the field forward in important ways, and of centering non-academic community voices and ideas in the development of novel and important therapeutic approaches.

Excellence in Research Josephine Sanchez



Josephine's work and growth in the process of doing it exemplifies all that we strive to teach at PAU. This is an original data collection study in an understudied population and will be an impactful contribution to the literature.

Excellence in Research Robert Hickson




Bobby is an exceptional and driven student who acquired a strong foundation in scientific research. I have been consistently impressed by his ability to initiate and manage multiple projects with remarkable efficiency. He has independently navigated a large multisite dataset (Adolescent Brain Cognitive Development, ABCD), developed complex statistical models, mastered neuroimaging data analysis, and has taken the lead on manuscript development—all while advancing his dissertation. It should be stated that Bobby has consistently demonstrated excellence in research and maintains a high level of research productivity. Although he is in the early stages of his research career, he has already contributed to several high impacted peer-reviewed publications, both as a first author and co-author. His outstanding work was recognized by the Society for Neuroscience (SfN) with the Trainee Professional Development Award in 2024 and by the International Neuropsychology Society (INS) with the SLC Research Award in 2025. Based on his most recent work, Bobby has submitted a manuscript entitled: Using Bayesian Logistic Regression to Assess Functional Connectivity of Large-Scale Brain Networks Associated with Anxiety from Social Situations in Early Adolescence. Notably, Bobby conducts innovative, impactful, and clinically relevant research.

Excellence in Research Hua (Poppy) Huo



I strongly recommend Poppy to receive the Award for Excellence in Research. Poppy's research focuses on strength-based and culturally relevant coping with acculturative stress among Asian Americans and immigrants. Impressively, she recently published an article titled "Barriers to Mental Health Help-Seeking among Asian American Adolescents: A Systematic Review" in the Asian American Journal of Psychology, a top-tier journal in Asian American mental health. Her dissertation examined culturally specific coping (i.e., forbearance) as moderating factors for the association between acculturative stress, depression, and post-migration growth among Chinese immigrants. She transformed part of her dissertation work into a poster proposal and was accepted to present at APA 2025. In addition, she has provided valuable professional services, including serving as a conference reviewer for the American Psychological Association Convention Division 45 (APA 2025). She has served as an ad hoc reviewer for two peer-reviewed journals—Frontiers in Psychology and Journal of Adult Development.

Excellence in Research Daniel Baldini



Daniel is an exceptional student and dedicated to his research training. He sought out a volunteer position in my research lab as a student in the Master's of Psychology program, volunteering on multiple posters for national and international conferences in his first year. Within a year, he was co-authoring multiple manuscripts, and now as an advanced graduate student, he is pursuing the challenging two-manuscript dissertation - while first authoring another manuscript for publication, which involved the development of a new embedded validity indicator for neuropsychological assessment (the Reliable Letter-Number Sequencing Span; Baldini et al., 2024). Further, he has first-authored multiple grant proposal applications, with aims of advancing literature on embedded validity indicators in the new WAIS-5. He is the most productive and proactive research lab student I have trained in 13 years at PAU, and he is the most deserving student of this award.

Excellence in Clinical Work Mythili Ananthasayan



Mythilli Ananthasayan has shown outstanding skill and commitment in her clinical work in both her practicum at La Selva and in the Early Intervention Lab at PAU. Across thse settings, she has exhibited strong general clinical skills and an ability to adapt evidence-based practices to fit a given client's presenting problems, readiness, world views, and identities. Mythili is particularly effective in working with high acuity clients who have experienced trauma and loss; she is grounded, able to think on her feet, and skilled in balancing stabilization skills with strategies for change. Mythilli shows a high degree of cultural humility and awareness of the roles that minority stress and systemic contextual factors play in clients' presentations and response to treatment. She is self-reflective, uses supervision extremely well, and models transparency and receptivity for other students. Mythili's clients, fellow trainees, and supervisors have benefited from her compassion, skill, and collaboration.

Outstanding Student Madison Wright



Madison presents with a diverse and rich array of clinical and research experiences. Madison sought out research opportunities at her externship with the UCSF Epilepsy Center and she has presented her research on epilepsy and neuropsychology at the annual conferences for INS, AACN, and HNS. From this collaboration, she developed an outstanding dissertation project on the clinical utility of visuospatial memory tests in lateralizing seizures and detecting mesial temporal sclerosis in unilateral temporal lobe epilepsy. Madison also gave an impressive grand rounds presentation at the NAN conference. Her proposal was one of only three selected and she was the only student presenter. Beyond her research, she was even awarded the university's student mentorship award for her peer support and the work she has done with the student success office. She matched with her top site for internship and has gained experience in various neuropsychology specialty settings, including neuropsychological evaluations with Spanish-speaking patients, neurodegenerative diseases, and presurgical evaluations for epilepsy, brain tumor, and DBS. She has recently accepted a postdoctoral position at UCLA.

Outstanding Student Ashlynn Steinbaugh



Ashlynn has been an exceptional trainee in every possible way. She has TA'd for many classes, organized several research studies within my lab, co-authored and first-authored multiple empirical manuscripts, and excelled with exceptional grades in all of her coursework.
