Sharon Clark, Class of 1994, Ph.D. Clinical Psychology




Andre Bessette, Class of 2000, Ph.D. Clinical Psychology

I have recently become a Licensed Marriage and Family Therapist and have started a private practice in Los Altos, CA.


Christina Dennis, Class of 2017, B.S. Psychology & Social Action
